Season 2015

The events of the previous season had a positive impact on members. Many did not understand the clubs' history and the many milestones that created Te Puke Sports. The Jubilee celebrations sparked renewed pride in the club which was reflected both on and off the field.

"Old Pirates" initially launched in 2010, had languished with minimal interest, static membership and an undefined role within the club's structure. This changed with the appointment of Bruce Gordon as "Big Buccaneer" (chairman) with an active committee (Crew). Specific objectives were established to support the main committee and to work for the betterment of the club and its members.

"Old Pirates" immediately commenced the revitalisation of the club by arranging the display of historic photographs, memorabilia and trophy's. Honour's Boards were up-dated and displays made more prominent within the club.

Craig Jeffries commenced his 4th year as head-coach assisted by Dan Goodwin and Jake Paringatai. Manager Ross Flexman started his 13th year as Prem's Manager following on from seven years as Assistant Manager.

Coaches appointed to the Development team included Scott Tamihana, Nui Thomas and John Corbett.

The Western Bay Premier and Development competition was revamped and the season commenced on 14th March, with a "Western Bay Round" which, with little at stake, was considered to be no more than preparation for the up-coming Bayfair Bay-wide competition.

The Premiers faced Tauranga Sports losing 16-20 in a feisty match described as "more like a final".

Te Puke edged in messy opener for rugby season

Three yellow and one red card, persistent whistle blowing and passionate supporters venting their feelings... welcome to the opening day of the 2015 club rugby season.

The revamped Western Bay Premier and Development grades began on Saturday in what is supposedly a gradual easing in before the Baywide round begins on May 2. But no one told the players at Murray Salt Stadium as Te Puke Sports and visitors Tauranga Sports hoed into each other like it was grandfinal day. Tauranga held on to claim a 20-16 victory despite being a man down for the final 15 minutes.

Te Puke blooded a top prospect at openside flanker in Jacob Janson.

Players and spectators were left bewildered at the number of penalties and set pieces that ruined the spectacle.

Dan Hollinshead, just back from NZ Under-20 trials along with prop Aiden Ross, controlled play well for Te Puke and fullback Robbie Jones, new to this level, looked an outstanding counterattacker.

Following their first defeat the team lost to Mt Maunganui, (13-18) and Te Puna, (19-23) however found better form in defeating Greerton (32-24) and Rangataua (26-8).

The team was placed 3rd in The Western Bay top-six.

The Development Team in its second season followed the same competition format winning 4 of 5 games in the Western Bay Round.

The Bayfair-Baywide competition commenced May 2nd with the first game against Mt Maunganui. A very satisfying victory was recorded.

He admits to not knowing how he will react when he finally gets to pull on the black jersey. Ross was a standout player in the 2013 Tauranga Boys' College 1st XV alongside first five Dan Hollinshead, who missed out on the squad for Italy after being right in the mix all season.

When he gets back from Italy Ross will focus on another long-term rugby goal of his, to play for the Bay of Plenty Steamers.

my body's right first and work on

picking up from where I left off last year.

"It's always been the goal, to play for the All Blacks. So I just need to get my foot right and make sure I do right by that, because I don't want to end up with a buggered knee or something."

The Prems' next encounter was against Opotiki on may 9th. A mammoth score 80-7 was recorded.


